The Academy Performing Arts Child Protection and Safeguarding Policy

The Academy Performing Arts School is fully committed to safeguarding the well being of its performing arts students involved in attending classes in the disciplines of Dance, Drama and Singing. Our policy applies to all staff and Chaperones volunteers working in the school. All staff are expected to work within this policy to safeguard children attending classes, rehearsal, competitions and productions organised by the Theatre School.

Underlying principles

All children deserve the opportunity to achieve their full potential.

All children have the right to be safeguarded from harm and exploitation whatever their:

- Race, religion, first language or ethnicity
- Gender or sexuality
- Age
- Health or disability
- Location or placement
- Political or immigration status.

Responsibility for protection of children must be shared because children are safeguarded only when all relevant agencies and individuals accept responsibility and co-operate with one another.

Statements about or allegations of abuse or neglect made by children must always be taken seriously.

Establishing a safe environment in which children can learn and develop.

All staff must be made aware of the need to be aware of child protection issues.

Ensuring safe recruitment in checking the suitability of staff and chaperone volunteers to work with children.

All staff & chaperones will be required to have DBS clearance.

Ensuring that parents have an understanding of the responsibility placed on the school and staff for child protection Parents will be expected to provide supervision for their children when an authorised chaperone is not available. The school principal will ensure annual child protection updates for all employed staff.

Actions to be taken if child protection concerns are identified

Any concern should be notified to the school principal immediately. The principal will contact the local authority with any concerns raised. Social Services Departments are responsible for investigating any concern and deciding on the course or action.

Ensure all staff and chaperone volunteers understand their responsibilities in being alert to the signs of abuse and responsibility for referring any concerns to the principal who is responsible for child protection.

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
